COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to the methods that linguists use for describing languages. It covers major areas of linguistic analysis: phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and historical linguistics. The overall goals are (a) to develop the skills necessary to analyze the structure of language, and (b) to provide a general training in analytic thought.

By the end of the course, students are expected to be able to:

- (i) recognize the diversity of language systems and their fundamental similarities;
- (ii) understand and use the basic terminology of linguistic subfields, including phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and historical linguistics;
- (iii) use linguistic analysis to investigate the organizing principles of languages.
