一、課程說明	<p>This course aims to explore some of the most important and/or controversial issues in Austronesian morphosyntax.</p> <p>Topics to be covered include: (i) reduplication; (ii) “subject”, “topic”, “focus”, “voice”, etc.; (iii) transitivity and ergativity.</p> <p>Data will be drawn from a number of Austronesian languages representing different subgroups and/or different geographical areas.</p> <p><b>***This course will be offered in English.</b></p> <p><b>POLICY ON AUDITORS:</b>  <b>The auditing option is available only to those who do NOT have a student status in Taiwan.
