一、課程說明	<p>This course assumes a basic knowledge of the Comparative Method of historical linguistics. Its goal is to provide a detailed discussion of the distant genetic relationships between the Austronesian language family and a number of other languages and/or language families (e.g. Austroasiatic, Tai-Kadai / Kra-Dai, Sino-Tibetan, Japanese, and Ongan).
